Bernstein, Co-Author
Of Nixon Books, Weds

"This wedding had to be wedged in between interviews about the book," Nora Ephron said yesterday as her marriage to Carl Bernstein of The Washington Post was being toasted with champagne at Esquire magazine, where she is associate editor. Mr. Bernstein, author with Bob Woodward of "The Last Days" and the earlier "All the President's Men," was even at that moment "off with Harrison Salisbury to do 'Between the Lines' for Channel 13," Miss Ephron said.

The couple were married Wednesday by Surrogate **Milard L. Midonick** in his chambers. Present were Mr. Woodward and his wife, **Francie Barnard**, a former Washington reporter for The Fort Worth Star-Telegram; **Richard M. Cohen**, a Post columnist, and his wife, **Barbara Cohen**, national editor of The Washington Star. Miss Ephron, a Wellesley graduate, and Mr. Bernstein, who attended the University of Maryland, met at a New York party in December, 1973. Each had been previously married; she to **Dan Greenburg**, the writer. Mr. Bernstein will resume his book-promotion tour with Mr. Woodward, said Miss Ephron, whose own recent book is "Crazy Salad: Some Things About Women." She said of the marriage, "Nobody's moving to the other person's town."

Alan Greenspan, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisers, confirmed to an interviewer this week that he has "been going out with" **Barbara Walters**. But when asked whether the relationship was serious, the once-wed but serious, the once-wed but long-time bachelor replied, "No comment." Mr. Greenspan, aged 50, and Miss Walters, the recently divorced 45-year-old co-host of the NBC "Today" show, were photographed together at a recent Palm Spring party.

It had been called "Minnesota's worst kept political secret," and yesterday Representative **Joseph E. Karth** confirmed that after 18 years in office, he would not seek re-election — the 44th House member to so announce this year. The 54-year-old Democrat, a member of the Ways and Means committee, said he wanted more time with his wife and three sons.

"If a thin, windblown man arrives on a bicycle, that will be my husband," said **Polly Burch** as she checked into a Miami hotel for the Easter holidays after flying from Hyannis, Mass. with her 14-year-old daughter, **Donna**. Sure enough, 47-year-old **Donald Burch** arrived Wednesday after 12 days on the road. "I feel good all over—I've done my thing," Mr. Burch said yesterday. But, he added, he will ship his bicycle and fly back with the family.

The photographer's model for ads made and scheduled for **Howard H. Callaway's** Crested Butte, Colo., ski resort is **Ione Haskell**, whose father, **Senator Floyd K. Haskell**, Democrat of Colorado, is conducting a Senate hearing into whether Mr. Callaway, a former Secretary of the Army, used political influence to get concessions from the Forest Service. Miss Haskell, a 25-year-old philosophy graduate of Colorado College and former Alpine racer, models part-time while working in a Denver advertising agency. She said that "my dad doesn't know about my individual assignments." An aide to Senator Haskell said that the \$150 modeling job was completed 10 days before the hearings were announced. The Senator's reaction, the aide said, was, "kind of one of those 'it's a small world, isn't it?' things."

In Atlanta the office of **Mayor Maynard Jackson** said that the city's first black Mayor, and his wife, who is known as **Bunnie**, had separated "in anticipation of a divorce." The couple, who met in college, have two children, and Mrs. Jackson has a child by a previous marriage. She is a partner in a publicity and tourism company with three other women, including the wife of **Henry Aaron**, the baseball star.

Natalie Chadburn, wife of a sailor who started across the Atlantic in an eight-foot boat more than a year ago, may at last have given up hope for her husband's survival. Allan Chadburn's will was filed by executors this week in Taunton, Mass. Mrs. Chadburn, 28-year-old mother of two, would say only "no comment" when asked if her permission for the action reflected a loss of faith.
