Der Stern' Gives In 1967 To Jackie

Der Stern voluntarily agreed yesterday to cut passages of a personal nature of its serialization of "The Death of a President" and its editor sent Jacqueline Kennedy a message saying, "I am sorry to have caused you displacement."

have caused you displeasure."

Henri Nannen, editor in chief of the magazine, said 122 lines were cut from the West German serialization and that they prepresente Mrs. Kennedy's "personal statements of feeling" at the time of the assassination of

her husband.

A Hamburg court two days ago refused to prevent Stern from publishing an unedited version of the serialization. The action had been sought by Look magazine, which made deletions at the request of the Kennedy family and tried to prevent Stern from publishing them. Look had sold the serialization rights to Stern for a reported \$72,500.

Am Mrs. Kennedy had replied to Nannen's telegram but did not make it public. In New York, however, it was reported Mrs. Kennedy replied:

"I wish to thank you for the decision to delete personal passages as I requested. This modification of der Stern's position is appreciated by Senator Kennedy and me."
