

'Two Figures at Killer's Window'

The French newspaper Paris-Press reported yesterday that an amateur photographer's 8mm color film taken just ten minutes before the assassination of President Kennedy showed two silhouettes at the sixth-floor window where the assassin's bullets are believed to have been fired.

The dispatch, from the newspaper's correspondent in Dallas, J. P. Renard, said that the FBI has viewed the hitherto undisclosed film strip—reportedly taken by an American sailor—and is now convinced that Lee Harvey Oswald had an accomplice.

The dispatch also said that a study of remains of food left in the room shows that the accomplice had apparently been in there the day before.

A thorough check of au-

thoritative sources in Washington convinced newsmen that the FBI possesses no such film, and that the Paris-Press story is untrue. The FBI itself declined to comment at all on its investigation of the assassination.

The Paris-Press story said it was believed that an accomplice helped steady the assassin's rifle, and that Oswald covered the accomplice's escape by killing Police Officer J. D. Tippit.

Correspondent Renard said a witness to the Tippit shooting told him that he saw two men—not one—running away as Tippit collapsed in the street.
