## Hearing Set On Motion to Exhume Body

WILKES-BARRE, Pa. (AP) —A judge today granted a hear-ing on a request by Dist. Atty. Edmund Denis to exhume the body of Mary Jo Kopechne, who was killed in an auto accident involving Sen. Edward M. Ken-

President Judge Bernard C. Brominski of Luzerne County Common Pleas Court set the hearing for 10 a.m., Aug. 25, at which time Dinis will present evidence to support his re-

quest for an autopsy.

Dinis, of New Bedford, Mass.,
district attorney for that state's southern district, said he would go ahead with a scheduled Sept. 3 inquest into Miss Kopechne's death, regardless of the court's

decision here.

THE 28-YEAR-OLD secretary drowned July 18 when a car driven by Kennedy plunged off a bridge on Chappaquiddick Island off the Massachusetts

ing her body from a cemetery in nearby Larksville.

Their lawyer, John Flanagan, attended today's hearing, but said only that he would have to confer with his clients before deciding his next step.

Brominski said Dinis apparently would attend the hearing, and Dinis had three aides certified as representatives in

certified as representatives in case he could not make it.

DINIS REPEATED that he considered an autopsy vital to considered an autopsy vital to the case and said it would show the medical cause of death. Miss Kopechne's death has been listed as drowning.

"Basically, I'm not satisfied with the findings made at the time of the accident," said

Mrs. Kopechne said she and her husband were "still deter-

mined to prevent an autopsy."

Dinis said he wants an autopsy so that the results of the examination can be included in the inquest he has ordered into the accident.

After the filing of the peti-tion, a hearing could be held in about 10 days, court officials

DINIS SAID he had three state police detectives investi-gating the accident in prepara-tion for the inquest which opens Sept. 3 at Edgartown, Mass. Mrs. Kopechne said the au-

topsy has turned into a political

"Mr. Dinis has not given us any definite reason for wanting an autopsy," she said. "We can't understand why he waited so long to do this. He is only hurting us."

Dinis has said that he had no plans to call Kennedy to testify at the inquest. However, he said developments in the case would detemine whether the senator eventually would be summoned.
