BOSTON (AP) - Sen. Edward M. Kennedy's attorneys asked today that an inquest into the death of Mary Jo Ko-bechne be closed to the press and public and that all witbe subject to crossexamination.

Kennedy's counsel, in arguments before the Massachusetts Supreme Court, contended the inquest would be "an accusatory proceeding which could result in criminal action."

Edward B. Hanify, counsel for the Massachusetts Democratic senator, asked the full bench of the state Supreme Court to declare the state's inquest law unconstitutional or lay down a new body of re-strictions on the proposed in-quest in Edgartown District
