"I knelt down but she fought me away—she wouldn't let me touch him," Behrman said.

"I said, 'What do you want an ambulance for then?'"

"She said, 'I want to get him to a hospital.'"

"I said that was what I was there for.

"We got him on a stretcher

but as we did, he said, 'Please don't! Please don't! Please don't lift me.'

"We got him down to the ambulance on a stretcher, but on the way Mrs. Kennedy kept pulling back on the stretcher saying she didn't want it going too fast, that we were hurting him," Behrman said.

"We got him into the ambulance. I wanted a little information for my book. She took it out of my hand and threw it into the lot of the hotel.

"From what I could see, he needed a bandage on his head—at the left ear where one bullet wound was. And I had to give him oxygen which he needed very badly."
