Keating or Reid May Succeed RFK

ALBANY (N.Y.) — (AP) — The names of former Sen. Kenneth Keating and Rep. Ogden Reid have been raised in speculation over whom Gov. Nelson Rockefeller will name as a successor to Robert Kennedy in the Senate.

While Rockefeller and other political leaders declined to discuss the impending appointment publicly, there is substantial private reflection on the subject at the Capitol.

Keating's name was among the first mentioned. The suggestion was that Rockefeller might wish to re-

turn him to the seat Kennedy won from him in the 1964 election.

Keating later was elected to the Court of Appeals, the state's highest court, but has only two years to serve before reaching the mandatory retirement age of 70.

Reid, who represents a Westchester County district, has been personally close to Rockefeller for years.

The 43-year-old congressman who was president of the old New York Herald Tribune is known to be interested in attaining higher office.
