

## A Quebec Threat of Vengeance

Albany

New York State Police in Albany confirmed yesterday that they had received reports saying that eight "Quebec revolutionists" had left Montreal to avenge the death of Senator Robert F. Kennedy.

The report said the eight were to travel through New York State last night and then attempt to assassinate President Johnson, New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller and Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey.

The alleged assassination plans were revealed in an anonymous phone call to the American Consulate in Montreal.

## Violence Probers Vow Objectivity

Dr. Milton Eisenhower yesterday promised "complete objectivity" in his approach as the head of the new presidential commission on violence named by President Johnson Wednesday night after the fatal shooting of Senator Robert F. Kennedy.

It was expected that enabling legislation would be introduced into Congress to give the commission that same powers as the Warren Commission that investigated the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

President Johnson ordered the commission to "look into the causes, the occurrence and the control of physical violence across this Nation, from assassination that is motivated by prejudice and

ideology, and by politics and by insanity to violence in our cities' streets and even in our homes."

Eisenhower, president emeritus of Johns Hopkins University and brother of former President Dwight Eisenhower, said he has been "concerned by the permissiveness, the lawless mob action, and the senseless individual killings."

But, he said, "I intend to approach the task with complete objectivity. Any statement will be that of the commission itself."

Eisenhower, who said he was "stunned" by Kennedy's death, said he would meet with President Johnson soon after the funeral to begin planning the commission's work.

## Poor People Urge End To Hatred

Under the shock of Robert F. Kennedy's death, the Poor People's Campaign shifted its focus yesterday and urged a vast national educational program to end hatred and violence in America.

Plans were announced for a series of prayer vigils in the area of the White House and the Capitol asking the Administration to stop the war in Vietnam and use the money being spent on it for the educational program.

Hosea Williams, director of demonstrations, said the prayer vigils would constitute the main activity of the campaign for the next day or two.
