## 'Hoped He'd Get Away,' Brother Says

ST. LOUIS (AP) — The brother of James Earl Ray, a c c u s e d of murdering Dr. Martin Luther King, said Saturday "I hoped he would get away," after he learned of his brother's capture in London.

John Larry Ray, 34, who operates a tavern in St. Louis, was reached by phone shortly after U.S. Atty. Gen. Ramsey Clark announced in Washington that James Earl Ray, the object of a massive manhunt for the past two months, had been arrested.

Earlier John Ray, when asked if he thought his brother was the killer, said "I don't know — I really don't know. I'll tell this much — whether he is or isn't, he's the fall-guy for all this. And that's for sure."
