

Two More Seated on Sirhan Jury

Two new jurors were seated tentatively yesterday in the trial of Sirhan B. Sirhan for the murder of Senator Robert F. Kennedy.

Several others were excused because of personal hardship or unspecified objections of defense and prosecution attorneys.

Three women and nine men have been tentatively seated, but attorneys for both sides may continue to dismiss them with challenges. The selection process may continue for another week.

New jurors accepted tentatively were Ronald G. Evans, a telephone company equipment installer from Inglewood, and Mary Lou Busby, a Downey High School mathematics teacher who lives in Highland Park. Her husband is a history teacher at Glendale High School.

In explaining trial procedure, the judge and attorneys emphasized that the first phase will be devoted to determination of Sirhan's guilt or innocence and the degree of guilt.

In the split proceedings, the second phase will be held only if he is found guilty of first-degree murder. In that case, the jury must decide whether to send him to the gas chamber or confine him for life.

All prosecutive jurors were questioned about possible prejudices relating to Arab-Israeli rivalry. All insisted that they had no prejudices that would prevent them from giving young Sirhan a "fair and impartial" trial.
