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'Deputies Told to Tag RFK Cars'

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LOS ANGELES — (AP)—

Sheriff's deputies were encouraged to issue citations to the motorcade of the late Sen. Robert Kennedy during his 1968 presidential campaign since he was not considered pro police, a former sheriff's deputy says.

Preston Guillery, 27, a deputy from 1966 to 1969 told the Assembly Select Committee on the Administration of Justice yesterday that a sheriff's sergeant told officers under him to issue tickets to the Kennedy motorcade.

Guillery also testified that officers were guilty of gross misconduct in dealings with minorities while persons in more wealthy areas of the county received special treatment.

Guillery, now a student said he served at the county jail and at substations in East Los Angeles and Malibu.

He said many persons arrested in the predominantly Mexican-American area of East Los Angeles were jailed on drunk charges but this was not the case in wealthier areas.

"Selective administration of justice" was practiced in the Malibu movie colony, he added.
