POLICE FACE SUIT IN KENNEDY CASE

CBS Wants Secret Data on Slaying of the Senator

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LOS ANGELES, Aug. 1—Two men and CBS-TV announced today that they would sue to force disclosure of police evidence in the assassination of Senator Robert F. Kennedy.

An official Police Commission said yesterday that it would not release a secret 10-volume summary of the investigation, because, according to its president, Samuel Williams, "more compelling weight fell on the side of protecting the confidentiality of those involved."

The two men are Paul Schrade, a former United Autoworkers official who was shot in the forehead when Mr. Kennedy was killed June 5, 1968, and former Representative Allard K. Lowenstein, who is now a consultant to Gov. Edmund said yesterday that it would

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For the last two years, the two men have been trying to gain release of the police summary and inspect the physical evidence in the case, including the Ambassador Hotel pantry's ceiling panels, which were riddled with bullets the night Mr. Kennedy was killed.

A CBS-TV attorney, Howard Privett, said that the network was filing suit separately today under the Freedom of Information Act to force the police to make the report available. Meanwhile, a court here ruled yesterday in favor of an evan-
