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Cuba Says 13 in Invading Party Are Dead or Captured

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MIAMI, April 27—Cuba announced today that all members of an exile guerrilla group that landed in Eastern Cuba on April 17, had been either killed or captured.

On Wednesday, Premier Fidel Castro said that only four "mercenaries" remained of the 13 who landed in Oriente Province.

The Ministry of the Armed Forces, said today that two of

the exiles were captured Friday and the remaining two yesterday. The communique added that Government forces had not suffered casualties in the last two contacts with the guerrillas.

The Government said that all equipment belonging to the exiles had also been captured.

In all, according to Havana, five exiles were killed and eight taken prisoner. Five members of the Cuban armed forces

were reported killed and one wounded in the original anti-guerrilla operation, which was carried out in one of the most inaccessible areas of Oriente.

The Cuban Government had attached considerable importance to the landing.

On April 19, Premier Castro charged that the "mercenaries" had come from the United States to interrupt the work of the 1970 sugar harvest.

After the Castro announcement, Alpha 66, a Miami-based

Cuban exile organization, said that the landing group had been composed of its members under the leadership of Col. Vicente Mendez.

Alpha, in a statement issued today, said that the fight would continue pursuant to its strategy of "irregular war" against the Castro Government.

Other exile sources here said that new landings in Cuba by the exiles would take place soon, if they have not taken place already, undetected.
