

NIXON NAMING OF 3 DECRIED BY WELCH

Birch Head Scores Murphy, Moynihan and Kissinger

BELMONT, Mass., Jan. 6 —

Robert Welch, founder and president of the John Birch Society, decried today the appointments of Robert D. Murphy, Daniel Patrick Moynihan and Henry A. Kissinger as key advisers to President-elect Richard M. Nixon.

Writing in the January bulletin of the ultraconservative society, whose headquarters are here, Mr. Welch said: "Those who think the election of Richard Nixon as President has made any real change in the course this nation has followed since 1933, or in the influences and controls that keep it on that course, are simply and blindly deceiving themselves with wishful thinking."

In the monthly agenda section of the bulletin, Mr. Welch also called for the formation of committees for "the movement to restore decency." The most urgent requirement, he said, is "organized nationwide, intensive, and angry and determined opposition" to sex education in public schools.

A preponderant majority of the American people, he went on, "are not aware of this filthy Communist plot, of the tremendous drive that is behind it."

Mr. Welch said he was disagreeing with, rather than seriously criticizing, the appointments of the three advisers to the President-elect.

Mr. Murphy, a retired diplomat who began his career in the Franklin R. Roosevelt Administration, is adviser on foreign policy matters for the transition period.

Sees Aid to Communists

Mr. Welch said Mr. Murphy "has always ranted unceasingly against the evils of 'colonialism,' has regularly spouted other arguments of the Communist propaganda line, and on every practicable occasion has used the full power and prestige of the United States Government to help the Communists in their program of taking over the 'colonial' areas of the world as Communist satellites or dependencies."

Noting that Dr. Kissinger, named assistant for national security affairs, was born in Germany, Mr. Welch commented, "We think that what makes Henry run so fast is a very positive urge—and possibly an idealistic one—to see the United States and Germany and all other countries become simply geographical divisions in a one-world empire."

"And since the logic of present events is that any such worldwide empire would be run by the Communists, there is no reason to believe that Mr. Kissinger is disturbed by that prospect in the least."

Mr. Welch also noted that Dr. Kissinger held three degrees from Harvard University and had been closely associated with "that alma mater of subversion" in one way or another since he got out of the Army at the age of 23.

Dr. Kissinger came to the United States in 1938 and was naturalized in 1943. He served in World War II with the 84th Infantry Division and the 970th Counterintelligence Corps.

Mr. Welch said Dr. Moynihan, who will serve as chief adviser on urban affairs, "has made his mark and steadily earned his promotion into higher echelons of the left by concentrating on one theme."

Aid to Negroes Criticized

Here Mr. Welch cited a summary in the society's "Biographical Dictionary of the Left." It read, "Moynihan's plans for social legislation on behalf of American Negroes would make it appear that the Federal Government existed for the sole purpose of applying Socialist measures to give the Negroes economic opportunity."

Mr. Welch said that "American Negroes, instead of being deliberately suppressed or exploited since they became responsible for their own lives, have in only three generations acquired the highest standard of living anywhere in the earth, except among the American whites."

"And even that gap was rapidly being narrowed long before the Earl Warrens and Daniel Moynihans started destroying the whole American system that made this progress possible," he asserted.

The Birch Society has for several years been conducting a campaign for the impeachment of Mr. Warren as Chief Justice.

The Communist design to promote sex education, Mr. Welch said, has three aims. First, he said, "this is a final assault upon the family as a fundamental block in the structure of our civilization." The result would be that the family would become, "as the Communists have always wanted," a temporary arrangement for economic convenience, he said.

The program is also designed, Mr. Welch said, "to destroy one whole generation of American youth." The result, he said, would be to convert the generation "into debilitated, directionless and unprincipled wastrels of their cultural inheritance."

The third and most important of the purposes, Mr. Welch said, is to help all the other forces at work to destroy the concept of morality.
