

# Rightists' Anti-Nixon Tract

## Seal Beach, Orange county

Thousands of copies of a new paperback book that accuses President Nixon of being the tool of a leftist international conspiracy are being mailed anonymously from here to prominent Republicans across the country.

Those directing the right-wing propaganda effort are prominent in the activities of the John Birch Society, but they insist that the ultra-conservative society itself is not directly involved in either the financing or mailings of the 141-page book, "None Dare Call It Conspiracy."

The author and publisher is Gary Allen, a 35-year-old writer for John Birch publications. He refused to discuss the sources or financing for what he described as

a plan to "saturate the country" with copies of the book before the November election.

## Flow

Allen reported that 100,000 copies are being mailed — at a cost of 20 to 25 cents a copy — to the Republican party's "key financial contributors" in California, Arizona, Washington, Oregon, Alaska, Hawaii and Louisiana. The prime objective, he said, is to "expose the true Nixon" and, hopefully, to disrupt the flow of campaign funds for his re-election.

The paperback book's title is adapted from that of an earlier book, "None Dare Call It Treason" by John Stormer, which appeared in 1964 and is still a best-seller in the Birch Society's American Opinion bookshops. "None Dare Call It Conspiracy" first made its ap-

pearance in New Hampshire just before the March 7 presidential primary there in which Mr. Nixon was opposed by Representative John M. Ashbrook, conservative Republican congressman from Ohio. Allen said 120,000 copies were sent from here to New Hampshire.

## Gift

"None Dare Call It Conspiracy," whose cover carries a \$1 price mark, is being mailed from a Seal Beach post office box held by Concord Press, with a title page notation that the book is "a gift from concerned Americans."

Concord Press is operated out of Allen's home. The mailings will be extended, Allen said, to "all important Republican contributors in this nation," followed by distribution to re-

tired military officers and later to a select list of what he called Republican party activists.

An initial California distribution of 50,000 free copies was said to have been completed last week to cut into Mr. Nixon's popular vote in tomorrow's California primary, and benefiting a right-wing slate of Republican delegates pledged to Ashbrook.

## Support

Asked why the six Western states and Louisiana were selected from the mailings, Allen explained:

"Those states have anti-establishment candidates of strong conservative principles. Practically, it is only in such states that we can mobilize support and raise the funds we need to circulate the book."

He acknowledged that financial support thus far had been disappointing. He added that six million copies of the book are in print.

Dealing with what it calls "an invisible government" allegedly controlled by the Council on Foreign Relations, the book contains little that is startlingly new.

The Council on Foreign Relations is described in the new book as "an American subsidiary of a secret international society dedicated to establishing a world government whereby a clique of super-rich financiers would control the world under the guise of socialism."

"Leftist international bankers," it is alleged, dominate Mr. Nixon as they have five other presidents before him, both Republican and Democrat.

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
