## JUDGE HEARS PLEAS IN 3 RIGHTS KILLINGS

JACKSON, Miss., Nov. 2—
Federal District Judge W. Harold Cox took no action today
on arguments for new trials by
seven men convicted of conspiracy in three Philadelphia,
Miss., civil rights slayings. He
postponed sentencing for at
least 10 days.

Attorneys for the seven
asked Judge Cox to throw out
the convictions returned in
Meridian, Miss., two weeks ago
because of a nalleged clearing
of the courthouse while the
jury was deliberating the case,
and a slip of the tongue by a
Government attorney.

The defense contended that
deputy United States marshals,
in clearing the courthouse, had
deprived it of its right to be
present at all times while the
jury was deliberating.

The defense attorneys also
contended that Aissistant Attorney General John Doar had
prejudiced the case against
Neshoba County Deputy Sheriff
Cecil Price, ome of the seven
convicted men, when he used
Price's name relative to a confession in which his name had
been deleted by the court.
