

Kissinger Flying to Warn Ky on Visit

Henry A. Kissinger, President Nixon's foreign policy adviser, flew to Paris last night in an ef-

fort to persuade Vice President Nguyen Cao Ky of South Vietnam not to attend a "March For Victory" rally here next week.

The White House confirmed that Kissinger would meet Ky in Paris. Press Secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the President's adviser will also confer with Ambassador David K. E. Bruce, the head of the United States negotiating team at the Paris talks, and his assistant, Philip Habib.

Reliable sources said Kissinger will try to convince the hawkish South Vietnamese leader that an appearance at the rally would be neither in his interest nor that of his country. The sources said they had indications that Ky would agree to stay away, or at least delay his arrival in the United States until after the October 3 march.

Kissinger's trip, which was arranged at the last minute, is viewed here as an indication of the dimension of the White House's concern over the diplomatic and political problems that would arise from an appearance by Ky at the rally.

Scores of anti-war and student groups have been organizing mass protests against Ky's appearance for the last week. Some have threatened to carry out a citizen's arrest against him, while others have laid plans for a counter-demonstration to protest the war.

A number of Congressmen have also protested Ky's planned visit, including Senator Edmund S. Muskie, (Dem-Maine), who warned yesterday that it would "deepen the divisions over Vietnam, escalate domestic tensions and increase the chances for violent confrontation."

"The United States march for victory" will be the second demonstration in support of the American involvement in Vietnam organized by Dr. Carl McIntyre, a right-wing radio preacher who is pastor of the Bible Presbyterian Church in Collingswood, N.J.

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
