Alanta, Ga., June 30 (AP) - A Colorado gun collector has asked a federal cort to declare him the rightful owner of Lee Harvey

Oswald's guns -- identified as those used to kill President John

F. Kennedy and Dallas policeman J.D. Tippitt.

The federal government wants to retain the guns -- without having to pay the collector, John J. King, for them.

After hearing arguments in the dispute yesterds, a three-judge panel of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals took the case under advisement. There was no indicatio when a ruling would be made; but the government asked that it be speedy since a new law goes into effect in November which would allow anyone who claims ownership of evidence seized after the assassination of a presient to sue the government of just compensation.

King's attorney argued that a payment of \$10,000 was made to Owwald's widow for the guns and that the government's claim that Oswald bo ght them illegally -- under an assumed name -- should not affect the purchase.

Assistant U.S.attorney B.H. Timmons of Dallas said it is the government's view that King "is nothing more than a reex trespasser or meddler" and that he knew he would not get the guns from the government.
