

**RUCKELSHAUS ASKS
CONTROLS ON F.B.I.**

COLUMBUS, Ohio, June 8 (UPI)—William D. Ruckelshaus, acting director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation said today that the legislative and executive branches of the Government should exercise greater control over the bureau and that both should re-examine their concept of the agency's role.

"The necessity to America of our major Federal law enforcement agency's not exceeding a wise exercise of its power is too important to leave to the judgement of one man," Mr. Ruckelshaus said during commencement exercises at Ohio State University.

"There must be effective oversight of all F.B.I. activities," he said. "This essential review and check should come from both the executive and legislative branches of our Government."

Both branches have failed to provide this review adequately, Mr. Ruckelshaus said.

"The legislative oversight is not sufficient today and needs to be strengthened," he said. "And the executive's understanding of the role of the F.B.I. in our society needs sharpening."

Mr. Ruckelshaus referred to himself as the "ex-acting F.B.I. director." President Nixon nominated Kansas City Police Chief Clarence M. Kelley as permanent director yesterday. The Senate must confirm Mr. Kelley's nomination.
