Kelley Bars Vengeance In Slayings

LOS ANGELES, July 2 (UPI)—FBI Director Clarence M. Kelley attended the funerals Tuesday of two agents killed on a South Dakota Indian reservation, then gave a personal promise to the killers that they can surrender without fear of vengeance.

* Kelley denied reports he attributed to Indian groups that agents intended to kill at least two Indians to even the score

two Indians to even the score.
"No statements have ever been made by FBI officials that we were going to 'kill one for one'," Kelley told a news conference.

"We do not handle our work in that manner. We try, and I believe successfully, to be professional and have no desire to invoke revenge."

He offered his personal assurances to suspects in the case that they will be treated fairly and will not be harmed if they surrender.

A force of 175 agents is currently assigned to the Oglala Sioux Indian reservation in South Dakota to track down the killers of agents Jack Coler and Ronald Williams, he

Williams and Coler were shot last Thursday, allegedly by Indian militants.

They were buried Tuesday in separate funerals in the Los Angeles area, with Kelley among the mourners at both.

Angeles area, with Kelley among the mourners at both. Services for Williams, 28, were held at Holy Family Catholic Church in Glendale. Services for Coler, 28, were held at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Long Beach. About 400 mourners attended each funeral.

Kelley presented the flag that had draped Williams' coffin to his parents, and the flag at Coler's funeral to his widow, Peggy, and their two children.
