Him, T.V.A. Aide Says

CHATTANOOGA, Dec. 27 (UPI)—An employe of the Ten nessee Valley Authority said today that a Secret Service agent recently interrogated him because of a report that he had made "strong statements" concerning President Johnson.

C. Jack Ferriss Jr., the employe, said he recalled describing President Johnson to some-one as "tyrannical, dictatorial, domineering and overbearing.

He said the interrogation lasted about an hour Dec. 6 in the late evening. The Secret Service office in Nashville con-firmed that Mr. Ferriss had been spoken to but declined any

firmed that Mr. Ferriss had been spoken to but declined any comment.

Mr. Ferriss is an honorably discharged Air Force veteran, and at one time was cleared for security to work on the hydrogen bomb.

Mr. Ferriss, who said he did not belong to a political party, added that he could not recall having made some of the statements attributed to him.

Referring to the interrogation, Mr. Ferriss said: "Is this the sort of intimidation that a private citizen should have to put up with? Must we fear knocks on our doors late at night?"

Mr. Ferriss recalled that the agent had refused to divulge any information about the person who had involved him, saying "our informer did not report that you threatened the President, but only that you made strong remarks and accusations against him."

Mr. Ferriss quoted the agent as saying also, "If our informer had reported that you had threatened the President, I would have to arrest you now."

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(AP)—Mr. Ferriss said the Secret Service agent had asked whether he had called the President a Communist. Mr. Ferriss also said he had been asked whether he was a member of the John Birch Society.

Paul Doster, of Nashville, a Secret Service agent, said Mr. Ferriss "was contacted by us regarding certain remarks he made, or, to put it another way, for certain remarks allegedly attributed to him."

"So far as we were concerned, the case was closed."
