

washington, March 12 (AP)- The commission investigating the assassination of President John F. Kennedy traced in detail ~~the~~ today the movements of Lee Harvey Oswald, the alleged assassin, right after the shooting.

The witnesses were Cecil J. McWatters, a bus driver, and William Wayne Whaley, a cab driver, who had picked up Oswald ~~who~~ after the shooting.

The witnesses themselves would not discuss their testimony with reporters, but Whaley said that "nothing is changed" from the previous story he had told.

The commission said that tomorrow's witnesses will be Mr. and Mrs. Declan P. Ford and Peter Gregory. It identified them only as being acquainted with the Oswalds on their return from the Soviet Union.

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According to previous stories, right after the shooting, Oswald slipped out of the building where he worked, walked about seven blocks, and boarded a bus driven by McWatters.

This was at 12:40 p.m. in Dallas. Six minutes later, Oswald left the bus, walked two blocks and jumped into a cab driven by Whaley.

~~Later~~ Oswald, later charged with Kennedy's death, was shot to death in the Dallas jail Nov. 24.

Yesterday's witnesses included Buell Wesley Frazier, the youthful neighbor with whom Oswald rode to work on the morning of that day (Nov. 22) and Frazier's sister, Mrs. Linne Mae Randle. They ignored newsmen's questions after the hearing.

Another witness was an FBI agent who identified the rifle and container found at the Texas School Book Depository building from which police say the fatal shots were fired.

Frazier and Oswald worked at the building. There have been reports that Oswald was carrying a bundle when he got into Frazier's car that morning and that when he was asked what it contained replied window blinds.

Chief Justice Earl Warren reported on the testimony to newsmen. When they asked him about witnesses' reluctance to answer their questions he said the commission had imposed no restraint. But one witness said he had been told not to talk to reporters.

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
