

DATA DUE NOV. 30 ON ASSASSINATION

Warren Inquiry Transcripts Will Be Made Public

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19 (AP)—The transcripts of hearings and the exhibits of the Warren Commission's inquiry into the assassination of President Kennedy will be made public Monday, Nov. 30.

There are 26 volumes, weighing 54 pounds. They will be sold by the Government Printing Office in complete sets only, at \$76 a set.

The White House announced today that the mass of testimony would become available for publication and broadcast at 6:30 A.M. Nov. 30. The first newspaper publication will be in afternoon papers of that day.

The testimony led to the commission, headed by Chief Justice Warren, to find that Lee Harvey Oswald, acting alone, killed Mr. Kennedy in Dallas last Nov. 22, and that Oswald was shot to death by Jack L. Ruby, also acting alone.

Sale to Start at 8 A.M.

The transcripts of testimony by several hundred witnesses and the contents of thousands of investigation reports are bound in hard-cover volumes. They will not be available from the Government in less expensive paperback binding, as was the commission's report.

The public sale will start at the Government Printing Office's regular opening hour, 8 A.M. Purchasers can obtain the volumes from 8 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. daily thereafter.

The books will be sold only in groups of two cartons each. One carton will contain 15 volumes of testimony and exhibits, weighing 26 pounds. The other carton will contain 11 volumes of exhibits, weighing 28 pounds.

Accredited White House correspondents will be permitted to purchase volumes starting at 8 A.M. Wednesday, Nov. 25, under a pledge to keep the contents confidential until the release hour. Four sets will be available for inspection by accredited correspondents at the Printing Office from Wednesday through Sunday.
