The National Violence Commission (originally named
The National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence) is reas
established by President Johnson 5 Jun 68.* Robert Kennedy was shot
5 Jun 68, at approximately 12:15 a.m. PDT, and died 1:44 a.m. 6 Jun 68.

The report of the Commission is issued in sections, that dealing with assassinations being made public 2 Nov 69. This section emphasizes that recent assassinations in the United States were nonconspiratorial, and says that historically "the evidence .. is overwhelming" that no Presidential assassination - with the exception of the abortive attempt on the life of President Truman - has been demonstrated to be the result of a conspiracy.

The Commission says that before Robert Kennedy was killed, "it might have been hypothesized ** in 1968 that the next assassin to strike at a President - or presidential candidate, as it turned out - would have most of the following attributes ... " With minor exceptions, the attributes listed conform to the official description of Oswald.
