Dear Jennifer:

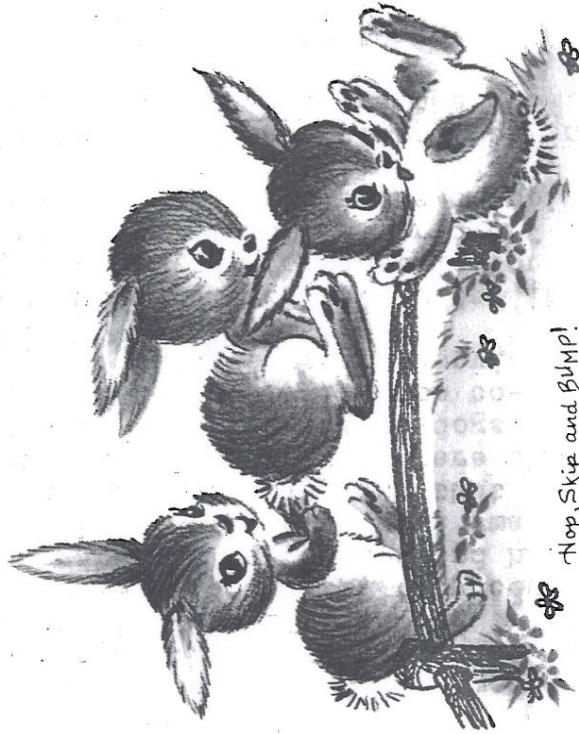

As of Monday, January 3, I'll be working Monday through Friday, but I'll have fairly regular hours, nothing as exotic as those you seem to keep. Whatever happens in the end, I am very envious of their ability to spend seven to eight months afloat. That's the only method of travel I'm interested in - and probably the one that is most remote for me.

The bunnies on the flap are to tell you that we have some here that feel quite free to come close. Harold was quite pleased yesterday when a couple of kids who live in the housing development back of us came over to ask if they could feed the animals. They had been here the day before and had brought with them a dog who promptly started chasing a small rabbit. Harold discussed it with them, pointing out that we like the animals and this is the only place around where they can feel safe and we don't want them being chased by dogs. They thought it was a wonderful idea and would like to cooperate, and Harold is quite pleased that he was so convincing.

The weather here has really been quite remarkable. Today it was very cloudy and rainy this morning (the forecast is for thundershowers this evening), but it has mostly cleared off and the temperature has been up to 60, although it is dropping some now. I can only hope that we will have a mild winter since that is the only time of year that I have to get out on a regular schedule - and I do hate wind and cold weather.

From starting out to write just a note in answer to your letter, I seem to have wandered pretty far afield. I hope I've not bored you, but my typewriter seems to take over.
