Been getting the Ex the past few days to watch Hearst squirm. His misery became apparent last Sunday, in which issue he usually has a long purported thinkpiece which begins with a hundred words or so on P1 and is continued for a full double column on the editorial page. He's always been a fervent Nixon supporter, natch, but last Sunday his usual effort was merely the 100 words on the front page, saying he was fed up to here with Watergate and was taking the weekend off. No continuation. In this dire emergency we were left WITHOUT GUIDANCE::!:

news stories are straight stuff from UPI or AP, but some of his columnists are getting restive, e.g. the enclosed by Marianne Means. Bob Considine, usually the embodiment of the chauvinist pigm contented himself today with rerunning a menu from some presd luncheon in NY recently which had a cover with a fanciful story about the condition of the press in 1975, with both news agencies closed down along with the NY Times, Burger and the packed supreme court reigning supreme, etc etc. Clearly, Mr. Considine is concerned.
