ALL THE PRESIDENT'S MEN.

Carl Bernstein and Bob Woodward. Simon and Schuster, \$8.95

An exhilarating and candid account by the two Washington Post reporters who won Pulitzers for their roles in breaking open the Watergate story-a book whose disclosures and speculations are themselves news in the 50-megaton range. Bernstein and Woodward have built their entire book of trip-hammer reportage from their detailed notes made from the time they began, as mere city desk "kids," to dig clues and facts from secret "sources" shortly after the Watergate break-in of June 17, 1972. Read as a behind-the-scenes story of a major newspaper bull-dogging one of the most serious scandals in American political history, or read as a mind-boggling unfolding of the facts, allegations and suspicions that have today put President Nixon in jeopardy of impeachment-either way the book is riveting. For the first time Bernstein and Woodward reveal that a minor Watergate figure, Hugh Sloan, was one of their anonymous "sources." Another was "Deep Throat," a man "in the Executive Branch," whose disclosures in predawn meetings in a garage were incredibly on-the-nose. The book closes with the appalling suggestion that the "ultimate dirty trick" of Nixon's 1972 campaign may have been the shooting of Wallace. BOMC featured selection. National promotion.
