In a letter to Kidd, Prox-mire said that "the possibility" of an appeal to the com-mission is "extremely thin ground for evading your duty to appear . . .

"... should this situation be permitted to stand, all witnesses before committees will be nothing more than censored recordings of whatever the executive department wants Congress to know," Proxmire continued.
