CASHING IN ON WATERGATE: Arlington House, a right-wing publisher, will bring out "the first insider's account of the Bay of Pigs" by E. Howard Hunt, Jr., titled, for some undisclosed reason, "Give Us This Day." . . . James McCord is paying \$10,000 to have his Watergate book published by Exposition Press, a vanity publisher in Jericho, Long Island. After offering the book around to commercial publishers for \$100,000 and getting no takers. McCord decided that Exposition offered better security and speed (Exposition publishes entirely on the premises) and a gamble for higher profits.

EDWARD UHLAN, the head of Exposition, says McCord has much more to reveal than he has yet disclosed, including evidence implicating Mitchell, though not Nixon, and information on cozy White House relationships enjoyed by Howard Hughes and F. Lee Bailey. Does McCord have tapes to back up his important charges? "You name it and McCord has it," Uhlan said. The book, called "The Watergate Sanction," will be our next month. Uhlan says he has \$2 million worth of libel insurance, which he hopes is enough.

A NUMBER OF REPORTERS are digging into the Bremer case on the theory that when Hunt was ordered to break into the assassin's apartment after the Wallace shooting, he was supposed to look for other kinds of documents than simply papers pointing to left-wing groups. One national magazine thinks it already has fairly hard evidence of a conspiracy.
