

Having read the xeroxes that are the subject of my today's letter to Maureen, I find myself wondering: if what I had not asked for was sent by accident or design. It includes hot ITT stuff not used by the Committee or the papers and hot CIA/Hunt/WH stuff not used by the committee. Example: CIA offered Hunt other services, including secretarial (but not the "young woman" for whom he had asked on a "loyalty basis." There are CIA memos not used in the hrgs or testimony or questioning. Hunt at the airport had a companion whose ~~name~~ pseudonym was Roy Anderson". When CIA met him and got the camera and film. So, it is not as sworn to, that asking for a secretary was too much. He also asked for specific credit cards, like Hertz and Avis. Why he would want a New York number and business address with someone who would accept him is not clear (Sandwedging?) And the NY number to ring in Washington yet! This does parallel what I have reconstructed of his past, in NYC and in DC. Read in haste one time only... ITT is enough to convict Mitchell for perjury by itself. Involves many others, inc. HRH, Ehrl, Colson and a Chicago judge. I wonder if McLaren was made a judge to get him out. He was the only problem ITT had in DJ. Also, this stuff leaves no doubt that Dita was ^{not} just an ornament. She was in on the wheeling-dealing, with copies to her and notifications that she was to be informed. Mitchell was also worked on through Agnew (Dear Ted). The letter I have apparently was hand delivered, to "Red", who also got a long memo of explanation, attached. These are dated in the year 1970, I think all in August. Somebody made a haul so hot it was not used. Including by the committee, which edited the CIA stuff to protect it and the WH. (The 2,000 words I did tonight were on its whitewash in Phase II.)... The CIA stuff had to have come from the CIA. A bio on the "young woman" is masked as I suspected the tape transcript would be. I take it from this that the clerk-typist was a bit more than that. And had more than "loyalty" to offer...
