U.S. Says It Did Not Repo Money It Allegedly Gave Watergate Defendant

WASHINGTON, Jan. 11-T Department toda charged President Nixon's can paign finance committee wit eight violations of Federal law in failing to record and report \$31,300 that it had allegedly given to one of the defendants in the Watergate bugging trial.

In a criminal information filed at the United States District Court, the Government said that the defendant, G. Gordon Liddy, was given between April and June of last year two payments of \$12,000 each and one of \$5,300, and that he "effected the expenditure" of an additional \$2,000 of Nixon campaign money.

None of the disbursements were recorded properly by the finance committee or reported to the Office of Federal Elections as required by the Federal Campaign Spending Law of 1971, according to the Justice Department.
