A Washington attorney has told a federal judge that a client of his had possession of eight boxes of documents, including plans to but the Watergate building, boxes, he says, [which] were removed from the White House after the Watergate arrests of last June. The attorney, Peter Wolfe, claims he's being pressured to reveal the name of his client, which he says is privileged information. Wolfe says his unnamed client had kept the papers hidden through the summer and then returned them to the Committee to Re-elect the President shortly before the elections. Wolfe sayd he wants protection for himself against contempt, claiming the prosecution knew about the material but somehow forgot about it. Well, the federal prosecutor, who is Earl Silbert, says that's preposterous, adding that he learned of these documents only a few days ago.
