On Oct. 4, Casey reported to Erickson that "the committee has requested documents from the file, certain documents." They discussed the fact that both the SEC and Justice Department were conducting investigations of ITT. Erickson said Justice "ought to have them (the documents)."

Casey immediately returned to his office and called a special meeting of the SEC at 3 p.m. the same day. The meeting lasted 10 minutes. At Casey's urging, the SEC agreed to turn over the hot ITT documents to Justice.
