Post *1 4/77 Eagleton Declines To Do Radio Spot

Sen. Thomas Eagleton has tor, said she was the perso been unable to meet a request that he record a 60second radio spot for the presidential candidacy of George McGovern.

Staff members for both senators deny the incident is a sign of any feuding among them since Eagleton, under urging from McGovern, re-signed as the Democratic vice-presidential candidate.

Eagleton press aide Michael Kelley quoted Eagleton's administrative assistant, Douglas Bennett, as replying there were technical objections and questions on the effectiveness of the proposed format.

Bennett, according to Kelley, is still waiting for a member of McGovern's staff to call back with suggestions on improving the broadcast.

Susan Davis, a member of the communications staff of Lawrence F. O'Brien, Mc-Govern campaign coordinawho called Bennett.

She quoted Bennett a saying Eagleton's trave schedule would prevent hir from taping the broadcast.

"They weren't very cool erative," she said in a phon interview.

Further complicating rela tions between the McGover and Eagleton staffs are handwritten notation on newspaper article sent h Bennett to Miss Davis' bos John Stewart, described b Kelley as an old friend (Bennett's.

The article from a Detro newspaper quoted M Govern sources as sayin there were unpublishe complications to Eagleton health beyond the nervou exhaustion which led t McGovern's request that h step aside.

On the article Bennett in scribed the comments "Thi isn't making things any be ter," Miss Davis said.
