These are also apparently incomplete if I can judge from breakdowns. 1st headed Recommendations with five bold-face letter breakdowns, perhaps an incomplete fifth, F, Use of Military Undercover Agents. 1st part is Operational Restraints on Intelligence Collection. A. Investigative restraint on Communication Intelligence B. Electronic Surveillance and Penetration. C. Mail Coverage. D. Surreptitious Entry. E. Development of Campus Sources. If I can judge from estimating what is typographical error, the next one is or the next part is Measures to Improve Domestic Intelligence Operations. ( 3 grags only.) Next is Analysis and Strategy, Memorandum for H.R.Haldeman. 1. Background. 2. Mr Hoover. 3 Threat Assessment. 4 Restraints on Intelligence Collection. 5 Improvement in Inter-Agency Coordination. 6 Implementation of the President's decisions. 7. Conclusion. Next is Decision Memorandum to the White House, 7/15/70, 8 numbered parts, signed Tom Charles Huston. Next is Organization and Operation of the IAG, 9 parts, numbered. I find it interesting that the authenticity was confirmed so soon, in the Post's introduction, by Huston, and in a separate story headline-attributed to the White House. Inference, confirmation of my suspicion that this was deliberately leaked by the WH for immediate purposes and because it knew the whole thing would come out anyway. Maybe some to hide the rest, maybe to subordinate attention to developments. The committee's copies not leaked. Only judge, prosecution and WH had other copies, from what has appeared. Baker suspected this would happen, so he took special precautions.
