

Demo Break-in Figure Shows Up, Ducks Press

Everette Howard Hunt, a former White House consultant whose name has been linked to the June 17 break-in at the Democratic national headquarters here, appeared in public for the first time since the incident yesterday when he showed up to make a deposition about his connection with the affair.

Hunt disappeared in mid-June, shortly after it was reported that his name and telephone number had been found in an address book belonging to Bernard L. Barker, one of the five men arrested in the 2:30 a.m. raid on the Democrats' offices.

Yesterday, the former Central Intelligence Agency operative managed to elude waiting reporters by slipping undetected into the downtown Washington offices of attorney Edward Bennett Williams, whose firm is representing the Democrats in a \$1 million civil suit against the five raiders.

Hunt worked 63 days for the White House in 1971 and 24½ days in 1972, earning a consultant fee of about \$100 a day. Until about two years
