A special White House telephone reportedly used for numerous conversations between two defendants in the Watergate break-in case, was actually installed for use by Nixon administration officials investigating leaks to the news media, according to presidential the special telephone. press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler.

According to a former White House secretary, the private, nongovernment telephone line was used almost exclusively for conversations between former White House consultant E. Howard Hunt Jr. and Bernard L. Barker, both of whom have been indicted in the break-in and alleged bugging attempt at Democratic National Headquarters at the Watergate here.

The secretary, Kathleen Chenow, told The Washington ministration leaks to the news Post in an interview last week that Hunt was among a group of self-labeled "Plumbers" who investigated news leaks to the media, but said the special telephone appeared unrelated to those duties.
