LOS ANGELES, Jan. 15-John W. Dean III said today he fully trusts the accuracy of Charles W. Colson's statement Nixon had received assurances the Supreme Court would protect the secrecy of the White House tapes.

His reaffirmation of an earlier comment to a television interviewer came at a news conference that he and his wife, Maureen, held on the patio of their \$130,000 Trousdale Estates home in the hills overlooking Los Angeles.

It was the first formal meeting with the press for the key Watergate figure since U.S. District Court Judge John J. Sirica released him last week from a federal prison at Ft. Holabird, Md., where he had been serving a one- to fouryear term.
