The paragraph—"Paragraph 5" of a two-page, seven-paragraph memorandum—had been excised before the memorandum was turned over to the Watergate committee by former White House aide Daivd Young, according to committee counsel Samuel Dash.

The memorandum was a status report dated Aug. 11, 1971, from Young and Egil (Bud) Krogh, director of the plumbers, to Ehrlichman on the plumbers' investigation of the leak of the Pentagon Papers by Daniel Ellsberg.

In the memoraudum, Krogh and Young sought and got Ehrlichman's approval to conduct a "covert operation" to get psychiatric reports from Ellsberg's psychiatrist. Several weeks later, a team of the plumbers burglarized Ellsberg's psychiatrist's office in Los Angeles but reportedly failed to find any of Ellsberg's
