The committee's request, involved 41 or 42 presidential involved 41 to 42 presidential conversations, some of which were not taped, all involve the Watergate cover-up. The President's failure to turn them over has been viewed by many as refusal by the target of the inquiry to turn over relevant evidence and in the opinion of Rep. Wilbur D. Mills (D-Ark.) has tipped the scales to the point where the House is now ready to impeach Mr. Nixon.

There have been several hints, but no solid evidence, in recent days that the White House is about to turn over the tapes. House Minority Leader John J. Rhodes R. Ariz.) offered to bet \$10 last week that the tapes would soon be turned over. Judiciary Committee Chairman Peter W. Rodino D-N.J.) said in a televised interview yesterday that he was optimistic. Both said they had nothing to go en but hunch or hope.

If the tapes are not provided, Rodino said, the committee will issue a subpoena demanding them. If the subpoena is ignored, the committee will go ahead with what evidence it has and probably will ask the House to cite the President for contempt of Congress. If this occurs, it could become a separate ground for impeachment.

The committee staff is tentatively planning to begin presenting its evidence to the committee about May 1 and extending over a period of about six weeks.
