

Argentines Strike to Honor Slain Labor Leader

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BUENOS AIRES, Sept. 26—

In a city hushed by a general strike, the body of José Ignacio Rucci, the Argentine labor leader who was killed by urban guerrillas yesterday, was borne through the streets to a burial with presidential honors.

Business in Argentina was brought to a virtual standstill by the 30-hour stoppage, which began at 6 P.M. yesterday in protest against the killing of Mr. Rucci, the secretary general of the General Confederation of Labor.

No newspapers appeared this morning. Public transport was halted although international flights were resumed at 10:30 A.M. Some groceries opened early this morning, and there were a few taxis on the streets among private cars, most of them making for the countryside to get away from the semi-deserted city.

Kidnapped Boy Freed

In a development that added to the tension, the police reported that another trade unionist had been assassinated. The police said this morning that four gunmen had killed Enrique Grimberg, a leader of the Sundicalist Youth Movement, a right-wing Peronist organization that has often clashed with left-leaning Peronist Youths.

The sources said that the gunmen had burst into Mr. Grimberg's home in Villa Urquiza, a neighborhood north

of the residential area where Mr. Rucci was shot to death 24 hours earlier.

The police said that the men who shot Mr. Grimberg had escaped in a small car and had taken a 5-year-old child with them believing that he was Mr. Grimberg's son. When they realized they were mistaken, they left the boy five blocks away. Mr. Grimberg was 34, was married and had two children.

There was no indication that the two killings were connected. In normal circumstances, Mr. Grimberg's death would have passed virtually unnoticed in the current Argentine

climate of widespread political and labor violence. Mr. Rucci was the third major trade union leader assassinated this year.

The body of Mr. Rucci, in a mahogany coffin, was carried on the shoulders of trade union leaders for the nine blocks from the labor confederation's headquarters, where Mr. Rucci's body had lain throughout the night as thousands of mourners filed by, to Government House.

There the coffin was placed in a hearse and a procession of more than 100 cars and buses passed slowly through the city streets to Chacarita Cemetery. Mr. Rucci was laid to rest in the vault of the metalworkers' union.

President-elect Juan D. Perón went to the funeral at the cemetery, where the police had difficulty in keeping an emotional crowd from mobbing him.
