

Chile Reports 11 More Executed

Santiago

Eleven men have been executed for attacking a police outpost, the military junta in Chile announced yesterday.

The deaths brought to 33 the number of persons killed by firing squads, the junta said, since it took power in a bloody coup on September 11.

The executions were car-

ried out Thursday night in Valdivia, 550 miles south of Santiago, after the 11 men were sentenced to death by a military court, the junta said.

The 11 were accused of assaulting a police post in the Andes foothills near Valdivia the day after the coup against Marxist President Salvador Allende.

Their leader was Jose Gregorio Liendo, known as Comandante Pepe, who was executed on Wednesday night in Valdivia.

The junta executed another 11 men after they were convicted by military tribunals, and reported that 11 more were shot for resisting arrest or for attacking security forces.

In addition to the executions, the junta says 476 persons have died in street fighting since September 11. Unofficial estimates put the figure much higher.

SUSPECT

Earlier yesterday, military authorities announced the execution of suspected leftist Luis Rojas. Rojas was shot when police arrived at his home Thursday.

About 5000 persons still remain in a detention camp set up in Santiago's National Stadium. General Oscar Bonilla, the interior minister, says 1525 persons have been released from detention since the coup.

Legislative leaders of ten Western European countries sent a joint appeal yesterday to the Chilean government to save the life of imprisoned Communist party leader Luis Corvalan.
