THE SPEAKER of the day at yesterday's meeting was Herman Stolley, Episcopal layman, and executive of a New Orleans chemical company. He discussed the life of St. Francis of Assisi and his work in reforming the Church of his time.

The speaker said that some-one similar to St. Francis was needed to correct bad conditions such as those existing during the saint's life-time. He added that St. Francis was an inspiring person who despite his troubles "sang who despite his troubles sang through his life and even sang in prison, entrancing his cap-tors, and who though regard-ed as crazy by many fellow citizens came to be adored by the whole world."
