Army Seeks Source of The Report

The Army is investigating how medical records on New Orleans District At-Jim Garrison torney reached the hands of a Chicago Tribune reporter, the Defense Department said yesterday.

Such records are supposed to be confidential unless the person concerned permits their release.

Chicago Tribune reporter Russell Freeburg, in a copy-righted story Thursday, wrote that Garrison was discharged from the Army in 1951 as totally unfit for military duty because of mental problems.

The Pentagon released a brief chronology of his service noting that he was "released from active duty by reason of physical disability in the grade of captain on Oct. 31, 1951."
