## Marcello Free **Under Bond**; Contests Ter

Rackets figure Carlos Marcello, 60, staging a last-ditch fight to avoid serving one twoyear federal sentence, today was at liberty under \$25,000 bond and facing another possible similar term for illegal-re-entry into the country nine

years ago.

An early arraignment in the Marcello's counsel press for a 3U.S. Supreme Court rehearing of denial of review of his conviction for assaulting- and intimidating an agent the Federal Bureau of Investigation. They also are asking a new trial in district

court at Houston.

The new indictment was handed to Judge James A. Comiskey about 11:30 a. m. yesterday, and sealed at the request of the U.S. attorney's office until Marcello could be arrested under a capias issued by the judge.

MARCELLO WAS arrested

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about 1:30 p. m. by U.S. marshals at his office in the rear of the Town and Country Motel on Airline Highway in Metairie. He was accompanied to the office of U.S. Commissioner Ingard O. Johannesen by two of his attorneys, Michael Maroun and Bruce D. Burglass.

He promptly posted the bond signed by the Allegheny Mutual Casualty Co.

Yesterday's indictment charges that Marcello, also known as "Calogero Minacori," an alien, was arrested and deported April 4, 1961, and that following the deportation to Guatemala he did not apply for readmission to the United States as required by the Immigration and Nationality Act.

IT WAS THE second indictment against Marcello for this same offense. It first was charged he was illegally in the country in 1961, after he sneaked back into the coun-

try from Guatemala.

He was a subject of a wide-spread search which ended when he surrendered to im-migration authorities at his Metairie home. Marcello la-ter was charged in two other ter was charged in two other indictments, one alleging perjury and conspiracy to defraud the government in connection with his obtaining a Guatemalan birth certificate. The other charged he tampered with the jury which tried him on the conspiracy indictment

HE WAS FOUND innocent on both indictments, while they were pending the charge of illegal presence in the coun-

try was dismissed.

Marcello, in addition to the two-year term imposed for astwo-year term imposed for assulting the FBI agent, faces the same sentence under the new charge, said Gerald J. Gallinghouse, U. S. attorney. Gallinghouse expressed hope

Marcello will be convicted on the new charge, serve time in both cases, and ultimately be deported.

HOWEVER, Marcello has been under a deportation or-der since 1952, based on a narcotics conviction in 1939. Efforts to deport him again have proved difficult because no country has agreed to accept him.

Marcello claimed he was born in Tunis, North Africa, but Tunisia, Italy, France, Mexico and other countries

have refused to take him.
Silvestro "Sam" Carollo,
the man who allegedly preceded Marcello as Mafia kingping in Louisiana, also is under indictment here for "illegal, presence." Arraignment has been delayed because of a serious heart condition.
