P. F. Gremillion of Louisiana Monday on five counts of perjury. It said he lied last January when he denied having interests in a bankrupt loan company.

Mr. Gremillion, already under a Federal found indictor of the would still be a candidate for re-election in 1971 and would file a damage suit against United States Attorney Gerald Gallinghouse, who brought the action against him.

Mr. Gremillion said the indictment was "nothing but an act of malicious persecution, an act designed and conceived to promote his [Mr. Galling-house's] personal image."

mr. Gremillion, already under a Federal fraud indictment in connection with the defunct Louisiana Loan and Thrift Corporation, was charged with lying before the grand jury Jan. 21.

The indictment said he "knowingly and willfully" lied in denying that he owned stock in the corporation, in stating that he had no "economic interest" in the corporation, and in saying that a \$700 corporation check he had received was for campaign contributions.

Mr. Gremillion was indicted a last year on 16 counts of mail fraud and conspiracy.
