**Garrison Pleads Not Guilty; Says He Is Being Repressed**

NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 15 (UPI)—District Attorney Jim Garrison pleaded not guilty today to Federal bribery and gambling charges. He said he was a victim of repression practiced by "a Government that was involved in the assassination of President Kennedy."

Mr. Garrison, looking pale and slimmer than usual, entered his plea along with nine codefendants before United States District Judge Herbert W. Christenberry. All 10, including two New Orleans po-

licemen, are charged with involvement in a bribery scheme aimed at protecting illegal pin-ball gambling in New Orleans. All entered pleas of not guilty and were given 60 days to file pretrial motions.

Mr. Garrison contends the Government is persecuting him because of his ongoing investigation of President Kennedy's death.
