

INQUIRY CONTINUED IN NIXON PLOT CASE

The Brooklyn district attorney's office is continuing its investigation in the case of three Yemeni Arabs who were indicted last month for allegedly plotting to kill President-elect Richard M. Nixon.

Acting District Attorney Elliot Golden said yesterday that his office and the Secret Service were conducting full investigations into all aspects of the case.

Since the men were arrested on Nov. 9, serious doubt has been cast on the credibility of the informant who tipped off the police about the alleged plot. Mr. Golden refused to comment on this yesterday, asserting that he has never acknowledged the existence of an informant.

On Nov. 14, however, Mr. Golden confirmed the name of the informant as being Mohammed Wazan Algamal, who

shared an apartment with the defendants.

All of the defendants are free on \$25,000 bail each. They are Ahmed Rageh Namer, and his two sons, Hussein Ahmad Namer, 20, and Abdo Amhad Namer, 18, all of whom live in a three-room apartment at 496 Hinsdale Avenue in the East New York section of Brooklyn.

The Namers have pleaded not guilty to indictments charging them with conspiracy in the first degree, criminal conspiracy in the first degree and two counts of possession of weapons and dangerous instruments and appliances.

Mr. Golden said the case would be placed on the trial calendar in January but he noted that this did not mean the trial would begin then.
