CINCINNATI, June 29-The Nixon Administration was denounced as anti-Negro here tonight by the chairman of the board of the racially moderate National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

As his final point he cited President Nixon's description of the ideal Federal judge. He quoted the President as saying that he favored "someone who believes in the strict construction of the Constitution - a judge who will not use the power of the court to seek social change by freely interpreting the law or constitutional clauses." Bishop Spottswood called this "the Administration's every seed opposition tration's expressed opposition to the equal protection clauses of the 14th Amendment."
