AGNEW TO MAKE 10-COUNTRY TOUR

Goodwill Mission to Begin at Inauguration in South Korea

WASHINGTON, June 17—
Vice President Agnew will
spend most of July circling the
globe on a goodwill mission to
Asia, Africa, the Middle East
and Europe, the White House
announced today.
A delegation headed by Mr.
Agnew and including Senator
James L. Buckley of New York
will represent the United States
at the inauguration of South
Korea's President, Chung Hee
Park, who will begin a third
term on July 1.

From Seoul, Mr. Agnew will go on to Sinapore, Kuwait, Saudi Arabia, Ethiopia, Kenya, the Congo (Kinshasa), Morocco, Spain and Portugal to "demonstrate the President's continuing personal interest" in these countries, according to Gerald L. Warren, deputy White House press secretary.

The delegation accompanying the Vice President to Seoul, which will then return to the United States, has a conservative cast.

Defeated Liberal Senator

Senator Buckley, campaigning as the Conservative party candidate and with White House support, last November defeated a liberal Republican, Senator Charles E. Goodell. Mr. Buckley subsequently adopted the designation of Conservative-Republican and will be late joining Mr. Agnew because of a commitment to address a Republican dinner in Indianapolis June 28.

The other members of Congress chosen by the White House to represent the United States at the inauguration are conservatives. They are Senator James B. Allen, Democrat of Alabama, and Representatives Samuel L. Devine, Republican of Ohio, and G. Elliott Hagan, Democrat of Georgia. All will join Mr. Agnew in Los Angeles on June 27 for the flight to Seoul.

In addition, the Vice President will be accompanied by the United States Ambassador to Seoul, William J. Porter; Adm. John S. McCain Jr., commander in chief of United States forces in the Pacific; former Governor Winthrop Rockefeller of Arkansas, and Bryce N. Harlow, former counselor to President Nixon.

The delegation was selected on the basis of "experience, because of their positions in life," Mr. Warren said. Mr. Devine said that he assumed he had been chosen because he is a "Nixon loyalist."

The trip will be Mr. Agnew's third as Vice President, the other two being diplomatic missions to Asia.

The Vice President's wife, Judy, will join him in Madrid, where he is scheduled to arrive on July 17. They will spend a week in Spain before continuing the trip. Mr. Agnew is to return to Washington on July 28.
